Call to worship (from Psalm 31)

In you, O LORD, we seek refuge; do not let us ever be put to shame; in your righteousness deliver us.

You are indeed our rock and our fortress; for your name's sake lead us and guide us,

Take us out of the net that is hidden for us, for you are our refuge.

Let your face shine upon your servants; save us in your steadfast love.

Call to confession

God promises that if we ask, we will receive. Jesus tell us to believe in him so that our hearts will not be troubled. We do not need to languish in guilt or regret or shame. We can come in faith, trusting God's grace and mercy, confess our sin, be forgiven and freed to live in joy.

Prayer of confession

Lord, we confess that we cover our ears to your commandments, choosing instead to carry out plans that cause suffering and inflict pain on others. We neglect to heed your instructions to care for the vulnerable and uphold the weak. Out of fear and selfishness we grab and hoard resources meant to be shared and distributed. In this season of uncertainty, we are tempted to seek control through self-protection rather than surrendering ourselves to you and trusting your promise to never abandon us. Forgive our unwillingness to listen to your Word and do your work. Hear our confession and grant us mercy. Amend our ways and help us to walk more closely with you. (*Silent prayer*) Amen.

Assurance of pardon (1 Peter 2:10)

Once you were not a people, but now you are God's people; once you had not received mercy, but now you have received mercy.

Friends, believe the good news, through Jesus Christ you are forgiven!
Thanks be to God. Amen.

In our anxiety over the duration of this pandemic and in our worries about the many and long ramifications of this trying time, we want desperately to believe in you and believe in Jesus. We pray for an outpouring of your Spirit. Send the Comforter, our Advocate, to show us the way, remind us of the truth and grant us abundant life.

Lord, we have questions. We know there are lessons we should know well but cannot seem to recall. We feel upended by so much change and so little control. We confess that there are commandments of Jesus we remember but struggle to keep. We need to be honest about our misgivings and doubts. Confident that you will love us to the end and despite our failings, we share with you all that troubles our hearts:

We are troubled by the mounting deaths caused by COVID-19.

We are troubled by the growing numbers of lost jobs and economic turmoil.

We are troubled by our inability to be close to the ones we love when they need us the most.

We are troubled by children missing out on their education, those who wonder when they will next eat, those with no place to find shelter.


We are troubled by the people wrestling with addiction, those suffering from mental illness and those languishing in loneliness.

We are troubled by pain within and without, the violence inflicted on the innocent, the cruelty perpetrated on the vulnerable, the scarcity that belies your generosity and abundance.

Lord, we come to you, aching to be given a place to rest and a space to set our burdens down. We come to you because we believe in you, your grace, your mercy, your compassion and your power. You promise us spaces of rest, inexplicable peace, joy not dependent upon our circumstances. In you we find our home. You set us free to do your work in this world.

Grant us the courage to name how we feel, lament what we see and then turn us toward the people who need their hearts put at ease. Make of us living stones who create buildings of relief, shelters of compassion, tabernacles of mercy.

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Lord, we boldly ask to follow you so closely that others will come to know you and believe in you through our work and our witness. May our faithful discipleship ease our troubled hearts and perpetuate the love of the One in whose name we pray, our Savior, Jesus Christ, who taught us to say when we pray, *Our Father...*

Charge and benediction (*Romans 8:38-39*)

For I am sure that neither death nor life, nor angels nor rulers, nor things present nor things to come, nor powers, nor height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.

May the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with you now and remain with you always.
